

IF connoisseurs of drama are asked to name the best Telugu social play, their



unanimous choice would be Kanyasulkam of Gurazada Appa Rao (1862-1915). First published in 1897, it continues to hold its supremacy as a classic.

Kanyasulkam revolves around the evil practice of old people marrying very young girls after paying "bride money".

The play has been translated into English, French and Russian, besides a number of Indian languages.

Prof. Modali Nagabhushana Sarma and Dr. Yetukuri Prasad have done a magnificent job of collecting and scrutinising voluminous source material and compiling them into 183 articles.

This compendium on Kanyasulkam (13 chapters) deals with the controversy on the authorship; background; Gurazada as a playwright; characterisation; role of Gireesam, language; Rasas; Gurazada's perspective; influence of contemporary society; influence of Telugu and non-Telugu literatures, etc.
